Testing takes approximately $3\frac{1}{4}$ hours

Students sit the test according to their age and the year level they are applying to enter. For example, a student currently in Year 9 applying for Year 10 for the following academic year, will sit the Year 10-12 English language tests, and Year 10 mathematics and general ability tests.

AEAS English language proficiency test results are not pass or fail. Test results provide accurate information on a student's ability to cope in an English medium learning environment.

English Language Tests – Years 10-12[#]

Tests are available for students entering Years 10-12.

- Vocabulary – 20 minutes
- Reading Comprehension – 30 minutes
- Writing Skills – 30 minutes, 200 words
- Listening Skills – 20 minutes
- Speaking – 10-15 minutes.+

English Language: Year 7-9 and Years 4-6[#]

Tests are available for students entering Years 7-9 and Years 4-6.

The test format is similar to the Year 10-12 tests, but tailored to the age and year level of the students.

- Vocabulary and Spelling – 30 minutes
- Reading Comprehension – 30 minutes
- Writing Skills – 30 minutes, 150 words for Years 7-9 | 20 minutes, 100-150 words for Years 4-6
- Listening Skills – 20 minutes
- Speaking – 10-15 minutes+

+Speaking tests are recorded.

Mathematical Reasoning Ability

The mathematical reasoning tests take 45 minutes. Different test papers are used based on the year level the student is applying to enter. Tests assess mathematical reasoning abilities and are not curriculum based. Questions are multiple choice. Students are not permitted to use calculators.

For accurate results, students must not practice mathematical reasoning tests.

General Ability

The general ability test is free of English language and takes 30 minutes to complete. It is a non-verbal reasoning test containing multiple choice questions that provide an indication of the student's general ability level. The total score provides an index of intellectual capacity and is independent of learning in specific subjects.

For accurate results, students must not practice general ability tests.

The AEAS Report

The AEAS Report provides

- an overall English language proficiency score out of 100
- a score for each English sub-test out of 20
- a recommendation on the minimum number of weeks of study required in an intensive English language program
- a raw score and a stanine score for the general ability and mathematical reasoning tests
- a recommendation on the school entry year level

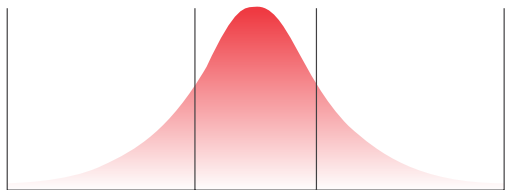

The AEAS Report will:

- assist parents and education agents to identify schools that match the student's needs and capabilities
- identify the student's current English language proficiency
- minimise the risk of the student entering English medium schooling before they have the necessary English language skills
- assist parents to plan a budget for overseas education, which includes the required intensive English language program

The AEAS Report is available within 10 business days of the test date.

How schools use the AEAS Report

The AEAS Report assists schools to understand the student's abilities and make an appropriate offer of enrolment.

Schools that test on application consider the length of the recommended intensive English language program when determining student commencement dates. Sufficient time should be allowed for students to develop the English language skills required in an English language learning environment. Schools may re-test students on commencement to determine they are ready.

Some schools will set expected AEAS Test scores for English, General Ability and Mathematical Reasoning Tests. Check with your agent or your preferred school for further information.

How to prepare for an AEAS Test

1. Practice Tests

Practice English language tests are available for Years 4-6, Years 7-9 and Years 10-12. The Practice Tests include the five English language components of the AEAS Test: reading, vocabulary, writing, listening and speaking. Students can familiarise themselves with the format of the AEAS Test and gain confidence from the practice test experience.

There are two practice test options

- **Practice Test Booklets** – students can prepare with a practice test booklet in their hand and can revise their answers.
- **Online Practice Tests** – students complete an online test within the required time and receive scores for reading, vocabulary and listening tests. Students can request a score and feedback from AEAS for writing and speaking practice tests.

Students must not practice the general ability and mathematical reasoning tests.
